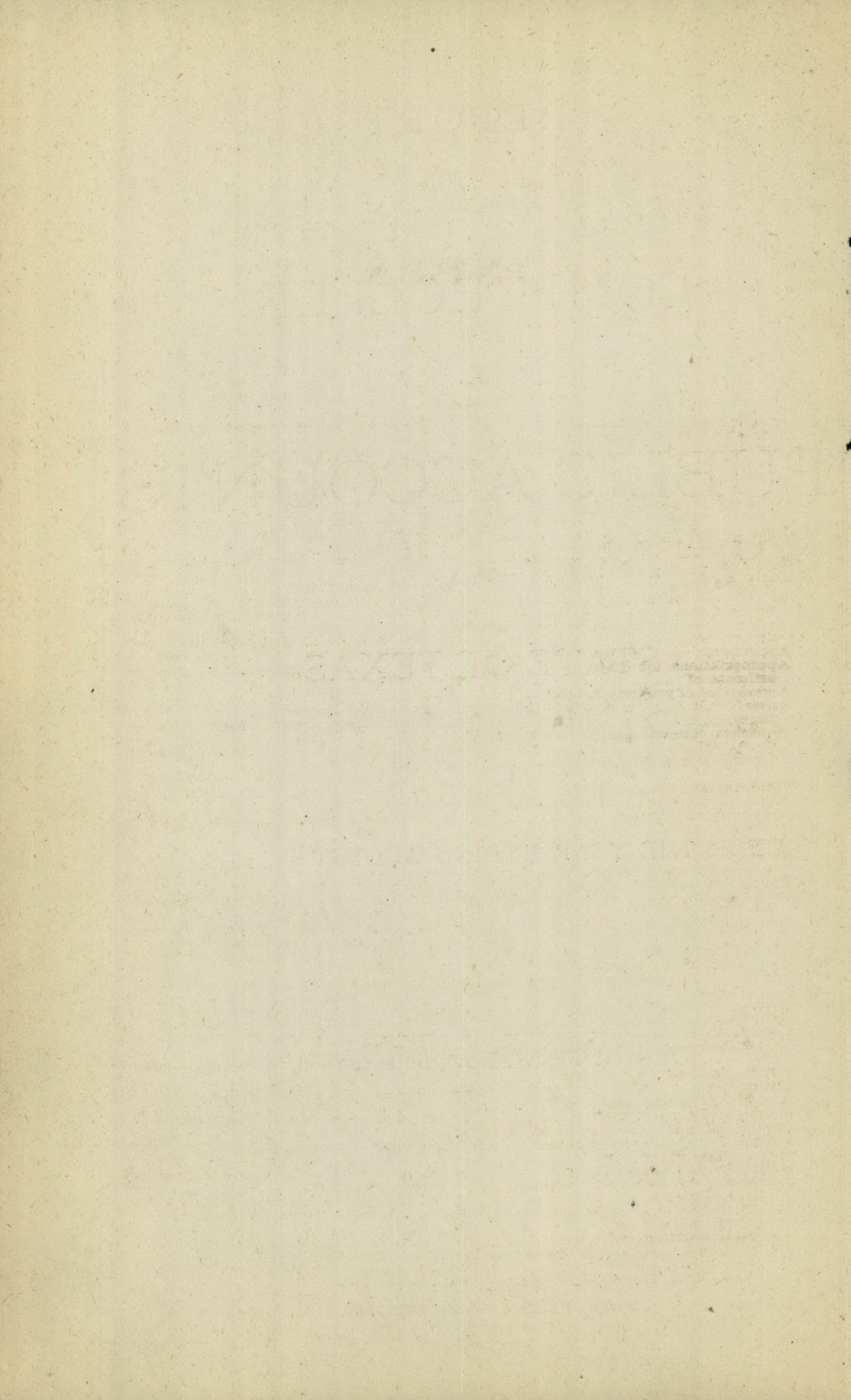

REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER.

OFFICE OF COMPTROLLER, }
AUSTIN, TEXAS, November 5, 1888. }

His Excellency L. S. Ross, Governor of Texas:

SIR—In obedience to the provisions of Article 2758, Revised Statutes, I have the honor to submit the annual report of this department for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1888.

TAXATION.

Taxation is the only permanent and reliable source of revenue. The only question to be determined is, whether the burden shall be borne equally and justly by all, or by those only who are patriotic and willing to contribute.

. In order to equalize the burdens of taxation every person should be required to pay according to the value of his entire estate. The right to tax, or the duty to pay taxes, arises in consideration of protection given by the government in the enjoyment of life, liberty, and property. Since the lives and liberties of all are valued alike, the amount of property owned should determine the amount of taxes due. Capital, whether employed in agriculture or commerce, whether profitable or unprofitable, whether employed or not, receives the same amount of protection, and should contribute alike to the support of the government. Money and credit constitute a very large and important interest in this State, and they should bear their portion of the burden.

To tax certain occupations and pursuits more than others, or to tax in proportion to the profits of any business, is not only an unjust interference with the liberties of the people, but highly impolitic in crippling enterprise and discouraging the energy and industry of the people.

There are many cunning devices of capital to shield itself from taxation; it should be taxed in all its varied forms as other property. It is well to observe that it mostly assumes the forms of credits, and unless it is taxed in these forms it will not be reached through other channels.

To tax a promissory note taken for the sale of property is not double taxation, for the property remains subject to tax in the hands of the owner while the estate of the vendor is not diminished, since he has only acquired a new legal right in the form of a note, which is alike the subject of protection and taxation.

The fact that the government recognizes money obligations and enforces the same at a heavy expense in the administration of justice, forms an undoubted basis for the right of taxation.

The demands of the government for means of support should be met, and revenue officers should be clothed with ample power and compensation to enable them to discharge their duty promptly and efficiently. In other words, let the officer be well paid and fully armed with power to execute the law and the duty will be promptly performed.

Table No. 1 details the source of these receipts, shows the total disbursements, and separates the transfers from the revenue account to other funds.

An itemized statement of warrants drawn is exhibited in table No. 78.

It is very gratifying that this healthy condition of the State finances can be shown. Almost the entire 1887 taxes had been collected, and reached the State Treasury before the close of the fiscal year. This is an improvement over all previous years, in the dispatch with which taxes have been collected and transmitted to the State Treasury; in fact there is but little room for a better exhibit under the laws now in force regulating the collection of taxes, and there seems to be but little need of further legislation on this subject. Our revenue laws, as amended by the Twentieth Legislature, are now understood by the tax officers of the State, and the effects of their operation have been fruitful to the State and the people. With reference to the prompt settlement of accounts by tax collectors, the law as it now stands requires final settlements before the first day of May; but there is no efficient law by which promptness can be insured in accounting for that portion of the tax rolls uncollected at that date. Each tax collector is charged with the entire amount of the assessment rolls of his county, and he may be prompt in remitting all of his collections before this date, and yet fail to effect a final settlement with the State because of the fact of his being unable to file with this department proper vouchers for the uncollected taxes.

I respectfully suggest to your Excellency the expediency of a law being enacted fixing a date prior to the first day of May for the meeting of the commissioners' courts of the several counties in the State, for the purpose of passing upon credits, to be filed, of uncollected

taxes, such as insolvent lists, sales to the State, erroneous assessments, etc.

Table No. 71 shows the exact condition of each tax collector's account, date of final settlements, amount of taxes collected from all sources of taxation, cost of assessing and collecting, and losses of every character. Final settlements with the State could not have been effected in most of the instances at an earlier date than is shown, on account of the failure of the tax collectors to get the approval of their commissioners' courts to the credits of uncollected taxes above referred to. Referring to the matter of exchange to be paid by the State for transmitting moneys to the State Treasury by tax collectors, the law, as it now stands, allows the State to pay only on remittances made direct to the State Treasurer by express or postoffice orders. In many instances deposits have been made by collectors or through their agents here, upon which exchange was claimed, but not allowed by the State. There are several county sites in the State where there are no express or postoffice order offices. In such cases, under the present law, the collectors are necessarily forced to bear the expense of getting the money to the State Treasury. I think it should be the policy of the State to pay the current, or a reasonable rate of exchange on all moneys transmitted to the State Treasury by tax collectors. This seems to me to be but a fair business proposition on the part of the State with her agents or servants. I therefore respectfully recommend an amendment to the law, healing this trouble without changing the present system or character of remittances to the State Treasurer.

RECEIPTS AND EXPENSES OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT.

Reference is made to tables Nos. 73 and 74 for a concise estimate of the annual receipts and expenses of the State government.

In arriving at the resources and liabilities of the State for the next two years, we consider the sources from which the revenues are to be derived, against the appropriations asked for by all the departments of the State government, in official replies to letters from this office, requesting estimates for the necessary appropriations for their respective departments. However, these estimates are not taken as an entirety, as it becomes necessary, in order to approximate as near as possible the result of the fiscal year's operations, to consider a part of two appropriation years, as the appropriations now in force differ somewhat from the estimates of appropriations to be considered by the next Legislature. Summing up the tables, we have the following, viz.

Estimated appropriations, \$2,044,971.20; showing an excess in the estimated appropriations over the receipts for that year of \$172,490.74.

Receipts for both years are based on the 1888 assessed values, amounting to \$681,084,904, an increase over the assessed values for 1887 of \$30,672,503. (See p. 130 for table of assessed values.)

In the estimate of receipts and expenses of the State government presented in the last annual report from this department, the receipts from all sources were estimated for the year ending August 31, 1888, at \$2,084,902.79; expenses, \$1,786,203.20, with estimated balance on hand at that date, \$1,187,670.03, against which estimate the actual receipts and disbursements for the year compare as follows:

The increase in the revenue receipts over the estimate is accounted for as follows: Receipts from United States Government indemnity fund, \$922,541.52 (your Excellency is to be congratulated that this amount reached the State Treasury during your administration), leaving an additional gain of \$131,042.26, which may be accounted for mainly from collections of back taxes, and the closer collection of the 1887 tax rolls over all previous years.

The large excess in the disbursements over the estimate is the result of the expenses and the extraordinary appropriations of the called session of the Twentieth Legislature, which was not contemplated at the time the last report from this department was compiled and submitted

to your Excellency, yet the above analysis will show how near that estimate has approximated the regular and ordinary fiscal operation of the State Government for the past year.

AVAILABLE SCHOOL FUND.

The embarrassment caused by the continued necessity of registering warrants drawn on the available school fund, could not in the past, and cannot in the future, be avoided under the present system of apportionment and operating the public schools. Conforming to the law, the Board of Education in July each year makes the apportionment for the next year beginning September 1. The schools open over the State in September. A period of about four months intervenes between that date and the time when the funds become in any measure available to meet the expenses. This question of school finance has become a serious one. The system of disbursing public funds on requisitions unattested by vouchers is inconsistent with the spirit and letter of our revenue laws, as this department should show the exact purpose for which public money is used. The loan made by the called session of the Twentieth Legislature of \$504,000 afforded temporary relief only. The constant every-day query from almost every section of the State "when will we get our school money," etc., places the Comptroller and the State Treasurer in a very unenviable position trying to explain the cause of the delay. There is no disguising the fact, that under the present regime, the system is unbusinesslike and pernicious, and is badly in need of the imprint of new and decided legislation.

PENITENTIARIES.

Reference is made to page 36, table No. 54, showing the condition of the account of W. G. Parish, financial agent of the penitentiaries.

It will be seen the balance in hands of financial agent August 31, 1887, was \$31,269.23; receipts at Huntsville, \$453,405.19; receipts at Rusk, \$54,366.81; the amount drawn from the treasury, \$127,750.00; making a total of \$666,791.23. Of this amount, \$477,372.00 was expended at Huntsville, \$172,128.43 was expended at Rusk, leaving a balance in the hands of the financial agent August 31, 1888, of \$17,290.80.

Thus it will be seen that the expenses at the penitentiaries for the year was \$649,500.43.

COMPTROLLER AS COLLECTOR OF SPECIAL TAXES.

Table No. 55, page 37, shows the amount of receipts issued by the Comptroller to be \$294,556.04, as follows:

Table No. 56, giving the names of drummers who have paid occupation tax, which amounts to \$17,885.00, as against \$42,385.00 for the year previous, being a decrease of \$24,500.00. This is attributable to the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the case of *Asher v. The State of Texas*.

Table No. 57 shows the amount paid by the Pullman Car Company to be \$83.00; express companies \$1500.00; telegraph companies \$3967.60; insurance companies \$19,474.98; railway companies, one-fourth of one per cent on gross passenger earnings, \$22,915.38.

Table No. 58. Taxes paid by non-residents of organized counties, \$117,422.76.

Table No. 59. Taxes paid by non-residents of unorganized counties, \$108,317.77.

Table No. 60. Taxes received from sale of lands in unorganized counties, \$1,713.45.

REDEMPTION OF LANDS IN ORGANIZED COUNTIES.

Table No. 63 shows the amount received by the collectors in the redemption of property sold to the State in organized counties, to be \$19,838.41, being a gain of \$4,482.87 over last year.

ASSESSORS' FEES FOR GATHERING STATISTICS.

There appears to be a glaring inequality in the amounts paid assessors for taking statistics.

For instance: The amount allowed the assessor of Galveston county by the Commissioners' Court for taking statistics, \$3,206.50. Galveston county has a population of 26,379, and the number engaged in agricultural pursuits is limited. Fannin county has a population of 33,872, and is considered an agricultural county. The Commissioners' court allowed the assessor \$1,000 for this work in that county. Hood county paid 5 cents for each assessment taken, Galveston 50, and Cameron county \$1.

There is a general want of uniformity in the amounts paid assessors. Counties having about the same population and valuation differ in amounts paid assessors hundreds of dollars. Table No. 70 gives the amount paid by the State to each assessor.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The Constitution provides that no appropriation shall be made for a longer period than two years, and that no money shall be drawn from the treasury except in pursuance of specific appropriations made by law indeed, the essential feature of an appropriation is to fix a limit and the special purpose for which it is to be used; hence, a general law, including an appropriation to carry out its provisions, should be strictly drawn, stating what should be a voucher against the appropriation.

Table No. 67 shows the estimate of appropriations necessary for the support of the State Government from March 1, 1889, to February 28, 1891. These estimates were furnished by the heads of the various departments.

OCCUPATION TAXES.

The receipts from occupation taxes, collected by tax collectors from July 1, 1887, to May 1, 1888 (ten months), were from the following occupations:

I respectfully suggest that the occupation laws be amended so that each person, or firm of persons pursuing an occupation that is taxed under our statutes, be required to register their occupation license with the county treasurer in the county where the receipt is issued, and that county treasurers be required to keep a suitable book for the registration of such licenses as are presented to them for registration. And to perfect uniformity in these records, I further suggest that the quarterly reports required of tax collectors under Art. 4742, Revised Statutes, should be made to run from the first of May to the thirtieth of April, conforming to the time in which tax collectors are given to collect the taxes and settle their accounts with the State, and that the registration of the occupation licenses by the various county treasurers be kept separate for each year (from May 1, to April 30). The keeping of these records in this manner would often furnish information to counties that is frequently sought and difficult to obtain. Table No. 65 gives the occupation tax in detail collected in all the counties.

THE DRUMMER OCCUPATION TAX.

By virtue of a recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States, in the case of *Asher v. The State of Texas*, on appeal from this State, the law of this State imposing an occupation tax on drummers, can not be enforced as to drummers representing houses doing business in other States, while the same is still in full force and effect, as to drummers who represent houses doing business within this State. The effect of which is an unjust discrimination against the commercial interests of the State. No doubt this injustice will be healed by speedy legislation.

TAXATION OF PRIVATE BANKS.

I desire to direct your Excellency's attention to the fact that this department is in receipt of many communications from assessors throughout the State, complaining that under the laws now in force they are unable to secure a full and complete rendition from private banks of their capital, etc.

The subject matter of these complaints being of such magnitude and of such material interest to the State and her citizens, that I deem

it my duty to acquaint your Excellency with the facts, trusting that the matter will be presented to the Legislature, and that such action will be had thereon as will remove the possibility, at least so far as can be done by legislation, of escape from just and proper taxation of capital invested in private banks.

The law now in force providing the manner in which private banks, bankers, brokers or dealers in exchange shall make their renditions, is in my judgment just and fair to all concerned. I quote it in full:

“All other banks, bankers, brokers or dealers in exchange, or stock jobbers, shall render their list in the manner following: First, the amount of money on hand or in transit, or in the hands of other banks, bankers, brokers or others, subject to draft, whether the same be in or out of the State (except United States Treasury notes). Second, the amount of bills receivable, discounted or purchased, and other credits due or to become due, including accounts receivable, interest accrued but not due, and interest due and unpaid. Third, from the aggregate amount of the items named in the first and second of the last two subdivisions shall be deducted the amount of money on deposit. Fourth, the amount of bonds and stocks of every kind (except United States bonds), and all shares of capital stocks or joint stocks of other companies or corporations held as an investment, or in any way representing assets. Fifth, all other property belonging or appertaining to said bank or business, including both personal property and real estate, shall be listed as other personal property and real estate.” (Sub. 4th, Chapter 108, Laws of 1883, p. 111.)

No unusual requirement is made by the law, nor is any hardship worked. Under this law private bankers are simply required to render their property—that which they own—for taxation, just as is required of any tax payer. But, notwithstanding the manifest justness of this law, its express terms and plain meaning, an examination of the tax rolls of this State discloses the fact that the complaints of assessors above referred to are well founded.

By what system of calculation, or by what contrivance, the remarkable results shown by the tax rolls are reached, I am unable to understand, unless it be that the oath required to be made by persons rendering property is regarded as a mere mechanical procedure, a matter of form, and that it is not a crime to violate it, with a mental reservation, where the government's revenue only is involved, and there is no individual sufferer.

It is shown by the tax rolls—made up from *sworn* renditions—that there are private bankers in this State who boast of a large capital of many thousands of dollars, and some who so advertise in the public press, who render for taxation but a few hundred dollars, or only their office furniture and fixtures.

With these glaring violations of our tax laws, assessors and boards of equalization seem unable to cope, claiming that the trouble lies with the law providing the mode of rendering, in that it permits in

some unguarded manner detrimental to the pecuniary interests of the State and counties, the deductions from "assets" to be so made as that the latter are entirely swallowed up, and very little, if anything, remains to be taxed; or it may be that the "assets" or "resources" are not correctly stated as required by the law. Thus the State, as well as the counties, is deprived of a legitimate revenue, and from these most prosperous enterprises to which is guaranteed equal protection by her laws, and to which encouragement should be given, but in some other form than that which seems to be permitted by the present law.

The result is—a discrimination against the *smaller* and *poorer* classes of taxpayers, whose property is mainly tangible and is reached by a *lien* for unpaid taxes, as well as against other moneyed capital, for the taxation of which more specific provision is made by our tax laws.

If the law complained of is defective, and it certainly is, else it could not be so grossly misapplied, some new plan should be devised by which capital invested in private banking enterprises in this State can be reached and compelled to bear its legal and just share of the burdens of taxation.

I submit to your Excellency the following form for renditions of private banks, bankers, and dealers in exchange, etc., which will, I think, remedy the evils complained of, or at least improve the present situation, viz. :

Assets.

Cash on hand (legal tender notes excepted).
 Loans and discounts.
 Overdrafts.
 Stocks and bonds.
 Real estate.
 Fixtures and furniture.
 Amounts due from other banks.
 Legal tender notes.
 And all other property owned by the bank.

Liabilities.

Capital (including surplus and profits).
 Individual deposits.
 Certificates of deposit.
 Amounts due to other banks.
 Notes, drafts and discounts.

These renditions to be made under the oath required by law.

I desire to add for your Excellency's information, and in order that the observations herein made may be properly applied, that so far as

the renditions of national banks and of banks incorporated under State laws are concerned, I have no complaints, but as to this class of banks the law is more specific and more stringent, and therefore it is more closely followed. (See Sec. 2a, Chap. 111, Laws of 1885.)

LANDS SOLD FOR TAXES AND BOUGHT IN BY THE STATE.

The act to provide for the sale of all real estate bid off to the State by collectors of taxes, at tax sales, the owners of which have not redeemed the same, approved April 7, 1879, as amended by act of February 5, 1884, requires the Comptroller, on or before the first day of January of each year, to make out and forward to the tax collector of each county a full and complete list of all real estate that has been sold to the State for taxes since December 31, 1876, the owners of which have failed to redeem the same within two years from date of said sales.

I have encountered the same difficulties in endeavoring to comply with this law as did my predecessors; lists were prepared and sent to the collectors of many counties. It soon became apparent that the sales of these lands would cast clouds upon titles, which would require years of litigation to remove. This being the case, I instructed the collectors to make no sales of lands embraced in said lists, but where parties came in to redeem, and the sale found correct, to permit the parties to redeem, as contemplated in Section 3, as amended by act of February 5, 1884; and where sales were found to be erroneous to cancel all such and notify this office, stating reasons why cancellation was made.

Lands which have been reported as sold to the State for taxes have been shown to have been paid on for the years for which sales were made, by presentation to this office of the collector's receipt, showing payment of taxes for said year, in which case the sale was canceled and the collector charged with the amount.

The greater bulk of these sales are erroneous, owing to the fact that the owners, from a want of knowledge, rendered their lands in the name of the wrong grantee, and paid their taxes in good faith. The lands owned by them were placed upon the unrendered rolls with proper description, as shown by the abstract of land titles, and sold for taxes, and the owner holding the receipt describing the land as rendered by him slept on in peaceful ignorance of the cloud upon his title, until rudely awakened to the fact that he had rendered and paid upon a grant that did not exist.

The tax laws of late years being so full and explicit, and now so clearly understood by land owners and their agents, with the help of the assessors, who are provided with the abstract of patented lands, but little trouble in this direction is, in the future, anticipated. The requirements of the present tax laws are now understood and are be-

ing strictly complied with, lands are being properly rendered and the irregularities that have occurred in former tax sales will probably occur no more, while the eagerness with which individual purchasers seek to obtain claim to lands by virtue of tax titles, and the meagreness of the more recent sales to the State, are evidences of future improvement in realizing more promptly the taxes on realty.

The attention of your excellency is especially directed to this matter.

This is a work, that to be understood, both as to its difficulties and magnitude, must be examined in detail, as shown by the records on file in this office. If the Legislature should see proper to appoint a committee for this purpose, I feel sure they could devise some remedy that would be just to the State and at the same time relieve the citizen, who had tried in good faith to pay his taxes, of the great injury that would be inflicted if the State should sell these lands.

DEFICIENCIES IN APPROPRIATIONS.

I call the attention of your Excellency to the amount of registered deficiency claims against the State, to be provided for by the Twenty-first Legislature. A proper regard for the honor and good faith of the State, will no doubt insure an early appropriation to cover this character of claims, now due the officers of the State. Insufficiency in appropriations of this character is false economy. No more can be drawn from the treasury than is required to pay for services authorized by law, however large an appropriation may be. On the contrary, if the appropriation is insufficient, the officers of the State who hold claims for services performed are greatly inconvenienced, and in many instances forced to sell their claims at a hurtful discount, to enable them to conduct the business of their offices. In making estimates for these appropriations for the next two years I have used as a basis the amount of claims filed and paid since the first of March, 1887, amount of deficiency certificates issued to this date, and the probable amount of claims that will be filed for payment before February 28, the close of the present appropriation year. (See table, p. 102.)

CLERKS' SALARIES.

In presenting estimate of appropriation necessary for the clerical force for this department for the next two years, I have done so with an eye single to the best interests of the State and the public service, and ask such salaries only as are deemed necessary to secure the *best* service. It may be considered an axiom in governmental economy that the cheapest service is that which is best performed.

BONDED DEBT OF THE STATE.

Referring to table No. 48, the bonded indebtedness of the State is shown to be \$4,237,730.00. Table No. 49 gives the amount and character of these bonds held by the School, University, Agricultural and Mechanical College, and Asylum funds, and the amounts owned by individuals, aggregating \$3,017,100.00 held by special funds, and \$1,220,630.00 held by individuals.

The called session of the Twentieth Legislature, under act of May 9th, 1888, created a sinking fund of \$250,000 to pay off such of the State bonds as fall due in 1890 and 1891, as are held by individuals. The issue of \$200,000 revenue 6 per cent deficiency bonds under act of February 13th, 1885, which fall due on the 1st of January, 1890, are all held in trust by the State for the School, University and Asylum funds. No other State bonds mature until 1892. Of the issue of May the 2d, 1871, 6 per cent funding bonds, \$65,200 are outstanding and fall due on the 1st of March, 1892, \$41,700 of which are owned by individuals. Under act of December 2, 1871, \$500,000 revenue 7 per cent deficiency bonds were issued and sold; \$467,000 of this issue are outstanding and fall due April 1st, 1892; \$207,000 are in the hands of individuals, the balance, \$260,000, being held by the special funds, making a total of State bonds held by individuals which fall due in 1892, \$248,700.

I therefore call the attention of your Excellency to the necessity of an amendment to the act above referred to, so as to make the sinking fund available at the maturity of such bonds as the Legislature may in its wisdom deem expedient to provide for. There are outstanding \$498,000 7 per cent frontier defense bonds issued under act of August 5th, 1870, and run 40 years, but are redeemable at the pleasure of the State on 1st of September, 1890. It would seem to be a wise policy to make provision for the calling in of these bonds by authorizing an issue bearing a smaller rate of interest—say 5 per cent; this would be a saving to the State of \$9980 a year, a total of \$199,600 at the maturity of the 7 per cent bonds.

FISCAL AND APPROPRIATION YEARS.

This subject has been referred to from time to time in the annual reports from this department. I quote from last report:

“The attention of your Excellency is called to the complications in adjusting the State’s accounts, arising from the fact that the fiscal, appropriation and occupation years end at different dates, the fiscal year ending August 31, appropriation year February 28, and the occupation year June 30.”

If the fiscal and appropriation years were made to close on the same date, much more satisfactory estimates could be made of the probable

receipts and disbursements of the State Government. As it now stands, in making these estimates it becomes necessary to consider either a part of two appropriation years, or a part of two fiscal years. The taxes for the previous year are collected and have been deposited in the State Treasury before August 31. The accounts of the State are all closed at that date. The first of September approximates the time when the taxes for the current year begin to reach the depository of the State, so that, it can be readily seen, if these years closed at the same time, the receipts and expenses for the year would run side by side, and thus enable the Comptroller to present more concisely and intelligently, to the general public, the probable receipts and disbursements of the State Government for a given year. The occupation year should be made to close on the thirtieth of April, the time the tax collectors are required to make final settlements with the State. The importance of this last change has been previously referred to.

CONCLUSION:

In closing this, my second annual report of the operations of this department, I desire to express my thanks for the courtesies invariably received from your Excellency and the heads of the other departments; and I take sincere pleasure in saying that whatever success has attended the administration of the affairs of this office is largely attributable to the efficiency and faithful service of those associated with me.

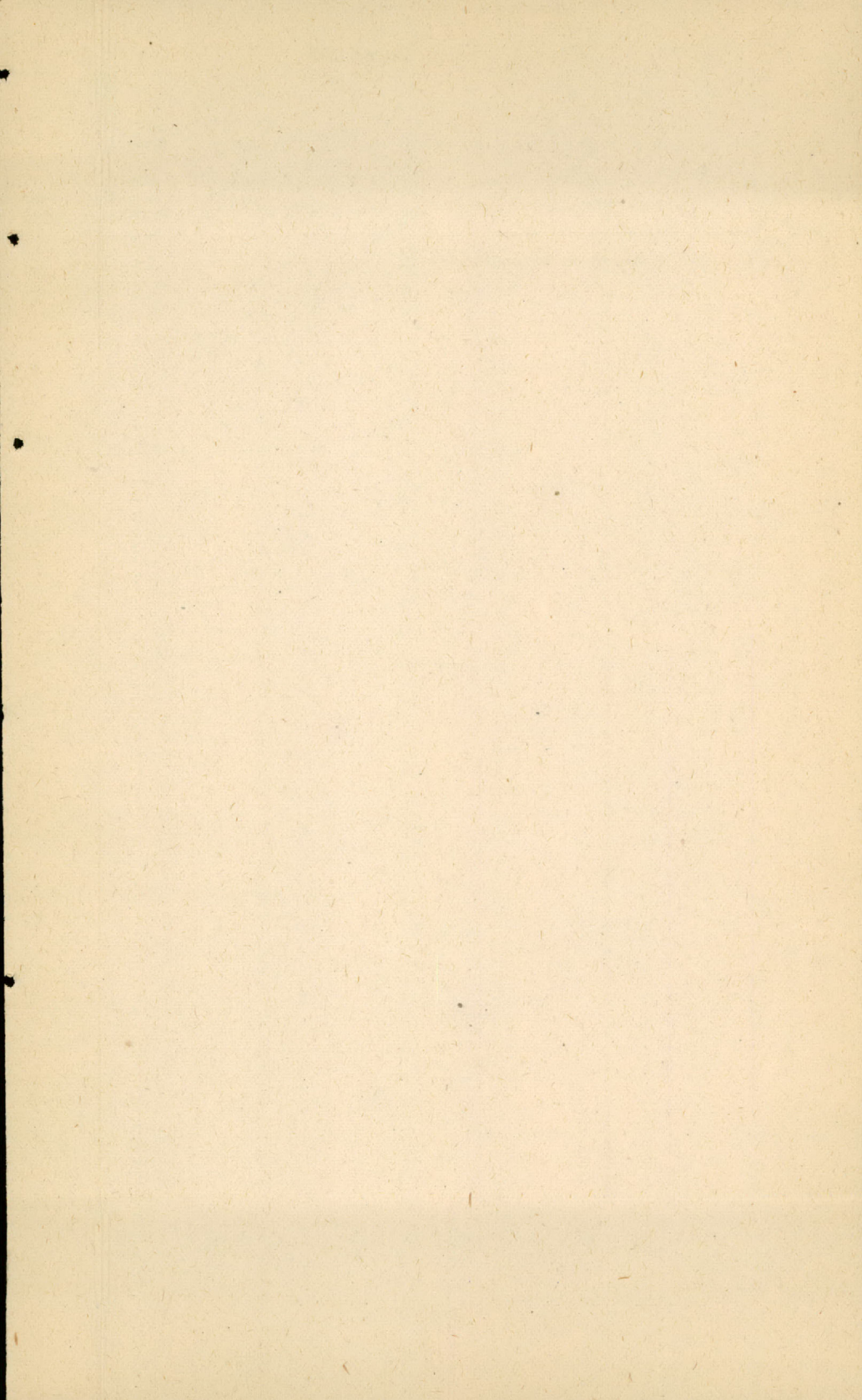
