9	fireworks permit holder may sell fireworks only to the public, and

14	(3) beginning May 1 and ending at midnight on May 5 if
15	the fireworks are sold at a location that is not more than 100 miles
16	from the Texas-Mexico border and that is in a county in which the
17	commissioners court of the county has approved the sale of
18	fireworks during the period.
19	(h) In addition to the periods during which the sale of
20	fireworks is authorized under Subsection (g), the commissioners
21	court of a county by order may allow a retail fireworks permit
22	holder to sell fireworks in that county only to the public and only
23	during one or more of the following periods:

- 9 (6) [(3)] December 15 of each year for each December
- 10 fireworks season.
